How does your project work demonstrate why you are the best applicant for this award? Some of your projects may fit under multiple categories. When you choose your award category (categories) consider ALL projects that have help you with your success in this area. You should also make the decision on where it is best to list items. Events and activities should only appear in one place within the application. The family guide is a good resource to also help organize project work.
